Budget 2025 Consultation

Keep your eyes peeled in January for information about how you can provide us with your thoughts about Budget 2025! As required by law, the CRD consults residents about its budget before it can be adopted, usually in March of each year. While each service budget has separate taxation proposals, the overall changes result in a total increase of 8.5% in the amount of funding required from property taxes. This varies by area depending on which services the property participates in, and can be impacted by different recreation services, fire departments, and other services.

Further review of the budget will be conducted in January following the release of the 2025 Assessment Roll, which informs the required requisition rates to fund

services. Business Plans, Finance-Budget Committee agendas, and other information about the budget proposals can be found online.

The expansion to the Anahim Lake Airport Terminal building was completed in November 2024 thanks to funding contributions from NDIT

and the Province of BC. The expansion increases the ability of the airport to comfortably accommodate more passengers, especially in the winter months when outdoor spaces are less available. The terminal building supports not only scheduled passenger movement and medivacs, but also serves as administrative space for the airport and is available as an incident command centre to external agencies such as the RCMP and BC Wildfire Service.

This project recognizes the growing importance of this facility to the Chilcotin region's tourism economy, along with its critical role in connecting the Chilcotin to the world!

Yes, You Need a Building Permit

The Cariboo Regional District provides building inspection services to various areas throughout the region. Residents can visit the CRD website at www.cariboord.ca to find out if they are in a building inspection service area or call their local CRD office to speak with someone in the Building Inspection Department.

Depending on the location within the region, building permits may be required for a wide variety of structures. The following summary list offers some common examples of projects requiring permits:

- 1. New Dwellings
- 2. Ancillary structures over 20 square metres (215 sq feet)
- 3. Decks over 0.6 metres (2 feet) in height above the ground
- 4. Decks "of any height" attached to dwelling
- 5. Mobile home placement
- 6. Mobile home additions
- 7. New Plumbing
- 8. Modifications "or repairs" to existing plumbing
- 9. Installation of a wood stove
- 10. Structural alteration
- 11. Renovations over \$25,000
- 12. Demolition
- 13. Building Relocation
- 14. Change of occupancy
- 15. Commercial building

The above list is provided for informational purposes only. We encourage all residents and property owners to check with the CRD Building Department before you start building or renovating. Knowing you have the right answers and the necessary permits before you begin can help avoid needless expense, wasted time, and disappointment.

Sign Up in January for Invasive Plant Services



Do you have invasive weeds taking over your property and are unsure of the next steps? The CRD's invasive plant management program offers free property assessments under our Landowner Assistance program. These take place during our field season from May-September. First come first served, limited spots.

This service is offered to provide tools and knowledge to local landowners in an effort to help protect our ecosystems from invasive plants that threaten the biodiversity of the Cariboo.



Assessments can include: plant identification, information on severity of infestation, integrated pest management strategies (managing pests in an effective, economical and environmentally sound way), best management practices to prevent spread, and time to answer any questions you may have.

Environmental Services Focuses on Sustainable Utilities with Asset Management Inventory

The Environmental Services Department is embarking on a vital project to strengthen the region's utilities infrastructure. The team is developing a comprehensive asset management inventory—a crucial tool for assessing the condition, capacity, and sustainability of our water and sewer systems.

Asset management involves identifying, cataloging, and analyzing the physical assets that make up our utilities infrastructure, such as water mains, sewer lines, wells, pump stations, and treatment facilities. By understanding the age, condition, and performance of these assets, the department can plan more effectively for maintenance, upgrades, and replacements.

For water systems, this means ensuring a reliable supply of clean, safe drinking water while reducing the risk of costly emergencies like pipeline failures or service interruptions. For sewer systems, it ensures the safe and efficient removal of wastewater, protecting public health and the environment.

In the long term, this approach will enable the Environmental Services Department to make informed decisions about infrastructure investments, minimize costs through proactive maintenance, and extend the lifespan of critical assets. For residents, this translates to better service reliability, enhanced environmental protection, and more predictable utility costs.

Know your Zone before you Build!

Even if you are not in a building inspection area, your property is subject to zoning and land use bylaws which restrict what you can build on your property and use land for. Zoning restrictions include limits on how much of your property can be developed, the size of primary and secondary dwellings, and the type of building you place on your property.

Before you consider construction of any structures on your property, we strongly encourage you to complete a zoning request form. This ensures that you are aware of and can comply with all applicable development restrictions before investing significant funding in your project. Properties which are developed contrary to the applicable zoning bylaw may be subject to fines or other enforcement actions.


Winter holidays are a time for families and friends to get together; but, that also means a greater risk for fire. Following a few simple tips will ensure a happy and fire-safe holiday season.

Holiday Decorating

- Be careful with holiday decorations. Choose decorations that are flame resistant or flame retardant.
- Keep lit candles away from decorations and other things that can burn.
- Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use, but not both.
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of light strands to connect.
- Use clips, not nails, to hang lights so the cords do not get damaged.
- Keep decorations away from windows and doors.
- Blow out lit candles when you leave the room or go to bed.
- Turn off all light strings, tree lights and decorations before leaving home or going to bed.

Facts

More than one-third of home decoration fires are started by candles.



Holiday Entertaining

- Test your smoke alarms and tell guests about your home fire escape plan.
- Keep children and pets away from lit candles.
- Keep matches and lighters up high in a locked
- Stay in the kitchen when cooking on the
- Ask smokers to smoke outside. Remind smokers to keep their smoking materials with them so young children do not touch them.
- Provide large, deep ashtrays for smokers. Wet cigarette butts with water before discarding.



Emergency Operations Centre After Action Reviews

As part of continued efforts to improve emergency management in the Cariboo-Chilcotin, the Cariboo Regional District recently completed a series of afteraction reviews. These focused on reviewing how the Cariboo Regional District responded to wildfires and the Chilcotin River landslide. Sessions took in feedback and input from individuals representing provincial agencies, First Nations, Indigenous governing bodies, emergency response organizations, and personnel who participated in the CRD's **Emergency Operations Center.**

Participants spent three days reflecting on aspects of the response which went well, challenges experienced during the response phase, and opportunities to improve emergency response processes and practices going forward. The findings from these after action reviews will be used to assess the Cariboo Regional District's emergency management practices and structure and identify areas for continued development.
